

Leon Black's Lawsuit against Wigdor is Dismissed

ON BACKGROUND

On March 6, 2025, the First Department dismissed Black's malicious prosecution lawsuit against Wigdor; the Court concluded that Black was unable to show that his claim had a substantial basis under NY's anti-SLAPP law. In remanding the case back down to the trial court, the First Department ordered that Ganieva and Black are entitled to attorney's fees. The anti-SLAPP law also contains provisions that could subject Black to compensatory and punitive damages.
